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Florida in Black and White: An Exhibit Where Local Teens Give Insight into Their Changing World Through Documentary Photography

Daytona Beach, FL – The Museum of Arts & Sciences is hosting a new exhibit titled, Florida in Black and White: Documentary Photography by Peter Schreyer and the Storytellers XVII through April 15, 2018. This dual exhibition highlights documentary photographs and oral histories by teen photographers and their instructor, Peter Schreyer, focused on the historic African American community of New Smyrna Beach.

This documentary photography exhibit stemmed from a Storytellers Teen Documentary Photography Project with the Crealdé School of Art. During the 10-week intensive program, 12 teens were taught by Crealdé professionals how to use a 35mm camera and how to tell compelling stories through documentary photography, with the goal of exploring and capturing the heritage of their west-side African-American community in New Smyrna Beach. The Storytellers program is grant-supported and is offered at no cost the participants with all materials and equipment provided.

This is the 17th Storytellers project mentored by Crealdé professionals. Peter Schreyer, CEO and Executive Director of Crealdé School of Art, is an award-winning photographer and educator who has documented Florida's changing cultural landscape for more than three decades. He teaches all levels of photography at Crealdé School of Art including documentary and traditional film classes.

Schreyer is the founder of the Hannibal Square Heritage Center in west Winter Park, a cultural facility that opened in 2007 to celebrate the heritage of the historical African-American neighborhood through documentary photography, oral history, and publicart. In 2016, he and the Hannibal Square Heritage Center were distinguished with a Diversity & Inclusion Award from the Florida Department of State, Division of Cultural Affairs.

As an American photographer with Swiss roots, Schreyer is interested in places, people, and communities that convey a sense of cultural identity, history, and heritage. "I never tire of exploring rural Florida, the historic African-American neighborhoods, the continually forming immigrant communities, the wide-open spaces of the West and small towns across America," says Schreyer. It is his

hope that his work will motivate others to become more aware of, to respect, and to explore their own community's history and heritage.

The tradition of the Crealdé School of Art is to choose a community partner for the Storytellers project, this time, the Mary S. Harrell Black Heritage Museum in New Smyrna Beach, which became the meeting place and classroom for the Storytellers XVII. Organizers then engaged another local west-side community partner, the Rev. Jeffrey J. Dove, pastor of Allen Chapel African Methodist Episcopal Church.

Besides learning how to process and edit film, the students were also taught how to write captions to accompany their images and were encouraged to do some research into the history of their imagery with family, friends, and neighbors. Many hours of work on the part of the participants and mentors was involved in the drafting and editing of the words that are now professionally framed. The result yields the Storytellers' personal moment in time, documented for posterity.
